"Besides, I had the contacts in that world. Previously, people in hip-hop did not. People knew who I was and the kind of coverage they would get. So I had the power to bring the goods in." Khan is responsible for teaching Mary J Blige how to walk in heels and showing the gentleman of rap, Diddy, how to dress. Aretha Franklin has him

stylist to be credited at the Metropolitan Museum of Art Costume. He beams: "It's great to be appreciated by people at that level, it brought me to tears."

Regrettably, Khan fell foul to the pressures of his glamorous lifestyle. "I needed to be seen in all the right places. in all the right clothes and that costs a huge amount in New York," he confides. On September 3, 2003, Khan was sent to prison on charges of defrauding eight of New York's most prestigious jewellers including Harry Winston and Piaget. He borrowed more than US\$1.5 million worth of jewellery only to pawn them off. "It was done through desperation," admits a repentant Khan. "I was relieved to be caught out. I hated being dishonest, it's not in my nature."

Luckily, the misdemeanour didn't damage Khan's career. "In America, especially in the music and fashion industry, everyone has a past. I'm not proud of mine, but I have to move forward, and work is the best way to do that," asserts the optimistic image-maker.

With his career back on track, the sparkling trendsetter is again hot property. From his humble backgrounds to his downfall, rebirth and glitterati mixings, "New artists loved Derek; he knew how to be a diva and helped them develop that attitude, that star quality," declares an Arista Records spokesperson.

Without the ornamental Derek Khan, the music industry would only be gold plated.
